BJCEM member since 2001, the **City of Ancona** candidature to host the 2013 Biennial has been approved after the Thessaloniki Biennial, on October 2011.

Main venue of the event was the **Mole Vanvitelliana**, the ancient city lazzaretto, designed in the 18th Century by architect Luigi Vanvitelli and close to the port area.

Several news characterized this edition of the Biennial:

- A new name, Mediterranea 16.
- The presence of **8 curators** coming from different European areas, who have been nominated to design the concept of the event and to select the artists' projects.
- A **unique international call** based on the curators' concept and the possibility for artists coming from BJCEM non-member Regions/Countries to participate.
- The maximum age to participate has been raised from 30 to 35 years old.

The curators and the concept





The 8 curators, Charlotte Bank, Natasa Bodrozic, Alessandro Castiglioni, Nadira Laggoune, Delphine Leccas, Ivana Mestrov, Marco Trulli and Claudio Zecchi, worked together in order to design the Biennial. They developed the concept Errors Allowed, focused on regimes of knowledge and self generated education strategies in the arts and the reflection both have on the broader society.

While conceiving the concept they have also tried to go beyond the disciplines division that has characterized all the previous editions of the Biennial, designing a conceptual path made of different sections that gathered the artists works around a common feeling/interpretation of the call.

The presence of the curators and the variety of their backgrounds met, at the same time, the need to overcame the outdated discipline-division Biennial model without losing a wide range look on the Mediterranean area.

The call and the selection

The call has been spread internationally starting from mid-December 2012. The first deadline, fixed on January 27th 2013, has been postponed to **February 17**th **2013**, in order to give more time to BJCEM members/partners to spread it among their territories.

The call was open for artists aged under 35 years old, coming from the territories where a BJCEM member/partner is operating. For the first time, the Association gave the chance also to artists coming from other territories to participate to the selection.

We received over than **1800 applications**, the 79% coming from BJCEM members/partners territories, while 385 artists (21%) applied from over than **70 Countries** all over the world. The 43% of the applicants were aged between 25 and 30 years old and the 35% were between 30 and 35; 51% of the applicants were women. The 58% of the participants applied as Visual Artist.

The artists' selection has been made by the curators. In some cases it has been forerun by some local **pre-selections**, with a local committee first evaluating the candidatures together with one of the curators.

The complete list of the selected artists has been published at the end of April 2013.

The selected projects were 170, and the total artists invited to Ancona were 220, coming from 36 different Countries.


Mediterranea 16: opening days

The Biennial opening was a 4 days event, from **June 6**th to **June 9**th, lighten up by a full program of conferences, meetings, concerts and performances.

Main venue for both the **Errors Allowed** exhibition and the live events has been the **Mole Vanvitelliana**, turned into the "head-quarter" of the Biennial, meeting point for the artists, the professionals and the audience attending.

The Mole hosted as well another small exhibition focusing on the young Italian creativity. The exhibition, called **Visioni Future**, was curated by Manuela Valentini.

Both the exhibitions were opened until July 7th 2013, but, at the end of July, the new City Council of Ancona decided to re-open them until **September 1**st **2013**.









The **Errors Allowed** exhibition was inaugurated on June 6th. The exhibition was developed in three main venues: two halls were inside the Mole Vanvitelliana while a special section, focusing entirely on design, was hosted at Poliarte, a local design academy.






During the opening days Ancona hosted 220 artists coming from **36 different Countries**: Albania, Algeria, Austria, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Cyprus, Croatia, Egypt, France, FYROM, Georgia, Jordan, Greece, Kosovo, Israel, Italy, Lebanon, Alan Island, Andorra, Gibraltar, Iceland, Jersey, Liechtenstein, Malta, Monaco, Republic of San Marino, Switzerland, Morocco, Montenegro, Palestine, United Kingdom, Serbia, Slovenia, Spain, Syria, Tunisia and Turkey.

More than **50 journalists** have been accredited, coming mostly from Italy, France and Croatia.

Post-Biennial events

As a sort of legacy of the Biennial and a path towards the next one, several post-biennial events have been organized by BJCEM partners since the end of the Biennial.

So far the events have been organized by: the City of Terni, the City of Padua, the Spanish Committee, the City of Milan and San Marino.
